It was quite the opposite, and perhaps this is why she stood out in her own unique and faithful way. In fact, Therese believed she could never live up to the other "saintly heroes" but she embraced small, daily hardships and tasks with a fervent love of God. In the autobiography, Therese writes: "I liken you, Mother, to the more valuable brush which Jesus lovingly takes up when he has in mind some great work upon your children's souls; I am the very little brush He uses afterwards for minor details." In her humility, devote love, and servant attitude in all the little things, Therese became known as "the little flower" and according to the Catholic Church one of the greatest saints of modern times.

Friends, how might we be like a little brush? That is, how might we allow God to use us in ways to make a difference in the lives of people? Although we might not have the strength to do some mighty task due to health, age, or competence, each day we have opportunities to do little things for God and neighbor. From simply doing our daily work and home tasks with joy to lending a stranger a hand out of love for God and not asking anything in return. Let's make a difference in all we do!
