Just imagine that you are one of new generation of Israelites standing at the banks of the chilly, Jordan River. You know your parents' story by heart, the amazing legend of how God led them out of Egypt and wanted to lead them into the Promised Land. You heard countless times how this new territory was full of possibility, potential, and God wanted to empower them to do incredible things through them. Indeed, over campfires and long hikes you heard over and over that this wild adventure would had cost them something with much uncertainty and risk. Unfortunately, you know how their story ended with them wandering in the desert for forty years because they did not have the courage to cross over to the land of milk and honey.

As you find yourself on the base of the Jordan River, which literally separates the wilderness from the Promised Land, you can now see across to the land that God promised. There is a decision you ultimately must make. On the other side are all the things that God wants for you ranging from establishing a nation, to be a light to the nations, and being a blessing to other people. However, it still comes with the same uncertainty, risk, and fear. And in a silent, yet powerful whisper, God subtly speaks these inspirational words: "I hereby command you to be strong and courageous; do not be frightened or dismayed, for the LORD your God is with you wherever you go" (Joshua 1:9). This is a beautiful story because afterwards, the Israelites do what their ancestors could never do. They go into the Promised Land and they discover it's everything that God said it would be: blessing, abundance, possibilities as well as challenges and hardships. Although there were certainly episodes that they would sway from God's ideal plan or simply miss the mark, at the end, they would eventually become the people God wanted them to become. However, first they and us, have to make the decision to cross the river.

While this is one of my favorite passages in the Hebrew Bible and a go-to story when I'm making a big decision in life, I also believe this Biblical scene is powerful for our church this year. In many ways we are standing at a river bank, and the future is wide open full of both possibilities and opportunities to be a blessing in our community and in the lives of others. Without a doubt, just like anything that is worth something, taking a step forward will come with its own weighty challenges, risk, and uncertainty. As you fill out and return your pledge cards on **Commitment Sunday**, **February 6**, this is a concrete way that together we step out in faith and cross the river bank allowing God to continue using our church to faithfully and fruitfully shine in new ways! Just as others before us at Fort Myers Christian Church had multiple river bank moments and faithfully moved forward, it's our turn to step out as we get through to the other side of the pandemic and continue to be a church that values outreach and inviting new people a church to call home.

As we cross over to this new fiscal year, we are going to bring everyone with us, in-particularly being intentional about placing special priority to our homebound and elderly so that they always feel connected and loved. One unique and kind way we will expand this ministry is by creating visiting bags to be given to our homebound members. Items in the bag will range from a candle, toiletries, devotional book, and more. Our outreach chair, Chana W., along with Sharla D., and one our newest members Judy H., are teaming together in this caring ministry. To fund this ministry, on February 13, worshippers will be given a mini M&M candy tube, which you can enjoy your chocolate and then you will be asked to return them filled with donations. For instance, if you fill the tube entirely with quarters this would equal \$14 or you are always welcome to place cash or checks in the tube. Whether you worship with us in-person week after week, homebound, or currently unable to attend due to COVID and other health concerns, we want to keep everyone connected and know they are part of our church family.
