


July Edition 2022

This is exactly what happens to twenty-something Hope Jensen in the novel *Christmas Jars*. Even though Hope is grieving the loss her adoptive mother due to cancer and now her apartment has been broken into, she still discovers a silver lining. During despair Hope finds an anonymous jar full of money someone left on her doorstep. The story moves on to share how Hope uses her journalist's instincts to investigate other recipients of "Christmas jars," and to figure out who started this meaningful and hopeful tradition. This tradition of saving a year's worth of spare change to give to someone in need for the holiday.

Members of our church's outreach team have not only approached me about this novel and its message, but also are excited about implementing this ministry. On Saturday, July 23, we would like to invite congregates and friends to the fellowship hall for a purposeful and fun morning as we get into the Christmas' giving spirit. Together we will watch the movie *Christmas Jars* as well as each family will have the opportunity to create and



decorate their own Christmas jar. Subsequently, throughout the year you will place money in your own Christmas jar and then give it to the person or charity of your choice for Christmas. In the sermon on the mount, Jesus said "But when you give to the needy, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your giving may be in secret. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret will reward you" (Matthew 6:3-4).

To connect this to the broader church and specifically in worship, the Sunday before, July 17, we will have a worship service as we celebrate Christmas in July. Yes, it's in the summer. Yes, it's 90 plus degrees outside and there is not even an inch of snow where our seasonal members are located. Yes, this is something we have never done before. No, I have not gone completely out of my mind. At the same time, yes, *We Need a Little Christmas*, as Johnny Mathis' song

is called. Today we are surrounded by 24-7 news reminding us of the escalation of gun violence, Russia and Ukraine war, political divide, high inflation, and your favorite news station can scroll down a much longer list that has the ability to raise anyone's blood pressure. Yes, we need a little Christmas...even in July!

While we are not necessary decorating the sanctuary as if were truly in the advent season and I'm certainly not pretending to be the known American magician, David Copperfield, who "supposedly" made it snow. Nevertheless, we will have a theme of Christmas. That is, we will sing a few of your favorite advent and

Christmas hymns. Additionally, Grace Anderson will be back with us as she intends to play a few classics on her violin to get us in the season' spirit. As mentioned above, while we are bombarded with news and signs that have the tendency to make us fearful and tiresome, I'll offer a sermon that highlights some of the traditional symbols and we will see how their meanings can offer us hope-even in July! For instance, to name just a few, I plan to touch on light, evergreen trees, and Christmas poinsettias. Let's remember Jesus is always with us, and I look forward to celebrating Christmas in July with everyone!
