

This Palm Sunday is a celebration and special day in our church. It has been over three years since we have had any sort of choir, yet thanks be to God, we are having a cantata! We have a mixture of new as well as familiar faces singing to give glory to the suffering servant, King Jesus. Each week it has been a joy to watch this

group practice before worship, and on Sunday it will definitely be a celebration as we begin Holy Week!

Each year in the Christian calendar, we mark this special holy day as we recall our Lord and Savior riding into Jerusalem. Traditionally, one version of this Gospel is read as we recall the crowds shouting hosanna in the highest. Also, we arrive on this day to numerous of Pastor Zach's and his neighbors' most prized palm branches spread over the sanctuary. (FYI-even my neighbors just expect this by now). Worshipers can



suspect to find one of the most traditional service orders, including singing *Ride On, Ride On in Majesty*, reciting a call to worship or litany with the phrase "Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord, and let's not forget the triple reminder (a pre-worship slide, verbal announcement, and fine print on the bulletin) concerning the upcoming Holy Week Service(s). Hopefully on Palm Sunday you leave on a high, signing up for your Easter lily or two, and humming in your vehicle as you call it a meaningful morning!

At the same time, I want to push back and invite you to use your imagination regarding the night of Palm Sunday or maybe as the humming comes to a halt. In particular, when the parade and crowds left as well as the cloaks and palm branches were picked up from the dust off the ground. The reason we must use our imagination is that Mark quickly moves us from the crowds celebrating to the next verse which is Mark 11:11 "Jesus entered Jerusalem and went to the temple. He looked around at everything, but since it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the Twelve". Pause. The end of the evening. Subsequently, our Gospel writer continues with verse 12 "The next day as they were leaving Bethany, Jesus was hungry..." (taken from NIV) Just take this in for a moment and reflect. Once again, I'll pose our question directly to you "What do you imagine Jesus was doing that evening in Bethany? Praying by himself, with his disciples, or possibly with his friends Mary and Martha? What might Jesus had been feeling or thinking, and on and on? Did Jesus have any questions, concerns, or worries? For instance, a few days later Jesus would be in a garden with some sleepy disciples praying "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; yet not what I want but what you want" (Matthew 26:39).

Perhaps Jesus was remembering glimpses of his early childhood story and how his family had to flee Bethlehem and be on the run like refugees searching for safety in Egypt. As tempted as Jesus might had been to neglect God's will and run for his own self-preservation, the Gospels proclaim what happen next. Even if Jesus was pacing back and forth, wrestling with thoughts and questions with his disciples, hundreds of years later congregations still gather because they heard what happened next. This time there is no running nor hiding, Jesus knew this was his hour and his time. According to the Gospel of John, we still gather together because Jesus was ultimately glorified!

As we begin Holy Week, let us not overly romanticized the days leading to Easter Sunday and remember Jesus' full humanity. Remember Jesus had feelings of pain, sorrow, and concerns just like you and I. This will not decrease our faith, instead, enable us to be more in awe and love of Jesus as we approach the cross. Furthermore, you might find yourself with even more depth and confidence confessing "Truly this man was God's son" (Mark 15:39).
