One bread, one body, one Lord of all, one cup of blessing which we bless. And we, though many throughout the earth, we are one body in this one Lord," this is the opening refrain of the powerful communion hymn *One Bread, One Body*. It only takes a few notes into the melody that my mind transcends time as I find myself remembering an inspiring worship service from possibly one or even ten years ago, a General Assembly, or even a children summer camp-help me God. Furthermore, this much loved and deeply treasured tune reminds me why I'm proud of our rich mainline Protestant denomination as we are exceptionally ecumenical. Simply put, we recognize and value other denominations and traditions as part of the body of Christ and claim Jesus is Lord of all. Or, to quote from our Stone-Campbell tradition: "We are Christians only, but not the only Christians" or "In essentials, unity; in opinions, liberty; in all things, love." Today, on World Communion Sunday, you will have the opportunity to come forward to receive the Lord's Supper from the one loaf of bread and chalice. As you come forward, simply open your hands to receive the bread which represents God's grace which is freely given to us in the midst of our brokenness and sinfulness. Whether you come forward for communion through intinction or receive the communion package in the back of your pew, we come to Christ's table with all our brothers and sisters of the faith throughout the world.

Throughout the summer months we have maintained a relatively strong worship attendance. It's both exciting to see one another as well as "good to be seen" as Dean typically replies back to my greeting from inside the sound room. At the same time, I want to challenge us to be intentional this fall. Specifically, let us be intentional about having a prayerful mindset and attitude when worship begins. What might this look like? This can certainly begin as early as Saturday night or Sunday morning when you wake up as you are consciously aware that you will be attending

Christ's church and you just never know how God might speak a word to you or even transform your life. Whether it be a hymn, a friend, or hold your breath...maybe even a story or point from the sermon. At the very least, on Sunday at 10:30am I want to invite everyone to a time of quietness, solitude and prayer when the chimes begin as we prepare and make room for the Holy Spirit to move.



On the other hand, I want us to be intentional about using and bringing back the greeting time in the worship service. While before and after worship are fantastic opportunities for both meaningful conservations and catching up with dear friends, the greeting time is designed to be a friendly, subtle way of showing hospitality and God's peace. In practical terms, to let someone know you're happy they are here or shake a visitor's hand letting them know there is always a spot for them at Fort Myers Christian Church. As you will notice in the bulletin, this will take place in the beginning of worship, directly after the announcements, and this will lead to a smooth transition as those who are able remain standing for the opening hymn.

This Sunday at 9:00AM we will begin our first official *Congregational Choir* rehearsal! Our director Ricardo is so excited to revive this choir and begin a more formalized congregational participation in the FMCC worship experience. As you may have heard, this choir will rehearse for 3 consecutive Sundays a month with their worship participation occurring during the 3rd Sunday of each month. Ricardo will approach this pedagogically by having the choir begin with some hymns, transition to unison (1 part singing), and then working into 3-part singing. Although we have a wide variety of choral experience in the ensemble, Ricardo will begin teaching from square one to lift up our new members and make sure everyone involved has an even comfortability. If you are still on the fence or have never sung before in a formal choir setting and want to join, you will be welcomed with open arms and will not feel behind in the slightest!
